TWO SISTERS – WITH JUST ONE WEEK SEPARATING THEIR 90 YEARS!

Our coming trip to Tauranga enables us to salute two extraordinary instruments that should have gone the way of the dinosaur when the movies found their voice, with the arrival of the "talkies".

However, these amazing pipe organs just continue to evolve and transform themselves to meet the ever changing needs of music presentation. Even in the millennium, audiences world-wide continue to be thrilled by the sounds of a theatre organ in "full-cry", just as they had back in the silent movie days. Created by the Rudolph Wurlitzer Company in the USA as a suitable replacement for the live orchestras accompanying silent movies, the concept of a pipe organ in a theatre, with all the tonal resources of the orchestra, went absolutely "viral" way back then!

Few wonders of the movie palace brought more shivery pleasures to audiences (or caused more breast-beating among crusaders for *culture*) than the Mighty Wurlitzer. Part one-man band, part symphony orchestra, part sound-effects department; the Wurlitzer was one of the most versatile instruments ever devised by man.

Of course, there were a score or more manufacturers of theatre organs, but the Wurlitzer basked in the same sweet sunlight of generic familiarity as the Frigidaire, the Victrola, and the Kodak. In America it might be a *Barton, Kimball, Moller, Page,* or *Robert Morton,* to name a few — or in England there was the *Compton* Company or *Christie* from the famed organ builders Hill, Norman & Beard. However to the average moviegoer, if it rose up out of the pit with a roar that made the marrow dance in one's bones — if rows of coloured stop-tabs lit by hidden lights, arched like a rainbow above the flawless dental work of the keyboards — if it could imitate anything from a brass band to a Ford motor horn to a choir of angels — then gee Dad, it *was* a Wurlitzer!

In 1910 the Wurlitzer Company took on the eccentric English organ builder Robert Hope-Jones, and I'm sure that they could never have guessed that the result of this union would capture the world market the way it did. By bringing together his crazy ideas about organ building and their financial clout, the "Wurlitzer Hope-Jones Unit Orchestra" as they were first marketed, was born.

By 1926, the company was almost swamped with orders for Unit Orchestra's from right around the globe. In this year the company made its first million dollars from theatre organ production and were shipping a complete organ a day from the factory in North Tonawanda, New York state, in a bid to meet demands.

On Friday, October 15, 1926, the Wurlitzer Company's 1,475th "Unit Orchestra" left their New York factory for the long journey down to the bottom end of the world and a magnificent picture palace in Queen St Auckland, called the Regent Theatre, which opened in December 1926.



The Regent Auckland Wurlitzer was the first of the larger organs to come to N.Z. and it had a busy life at the Regent until the theatre had enough sound movies coming through that the organ was no longer needed. In 1944 it was sold to the Hutt Valley High School to be installed in the school hall and in 1979 came back to Auckland for a whole new life entertaining thousands at the Hollywood Cinema in Avondale, Auckland, until August last year.

Back to 1926, and seven days and seven organs after the departure of the Regent Auckland instrument, Wurlitzer's 1,482nd Unit Orchestra departed, also for New Zealand but this was for the De Luxe, later renamed Embassy theatre in Wellington.

The Embassy Theatre Wurlitzer fared slightly better than its sister at the Regent, in that, like the Civic Theatre in Auckland, the organ continued to be part of the entertainment on offer when going to the movies. The Embassy Wurlitzer organ was also helped along by regular radio broadcasts right through to the 1950s.

In 1959, the Wurlitzer at the Embassy Theatre played its last notes and was sold to Mr. Eddie Aikin, a theatre organ enthusiast who installed the instrument first in a former honey-packing shed south of Tokoroa, and later in the school hall of Tokoroa High School. Ultimately, ill health forced Mr. Aikin to sell the organ to the Tauranga 20,000 Club. This organization, formed specifically to purchase the organ, donated the instrument to the City of Tauranga. With the support of the Tauranga City Council, the society installed the instrument in the Tauranga Town Hall in 1972. The Wurlitzer was once again featured as a concert instrument for many local and overseas artists until it was announced in 1986 that the Town Hall would be demolished.

The Tauranga City Council suggested that the organ could be relocated in the newly-constructed Baycourt Entertainment Centre—a beautiful performing arts facility located behind the Town Hall. The Tauranga Theatre Organ Society (formerly the Tauranga 20,000 Club) accepted the Council's offer. By the middle of 1987, the arduous task of dismantling and re-installing the instrument began, and by late 1988, Opus 1482 was playing once again. Dennis James traveled from the United States to present the premier concert of the instrument in December 1988.

In 2001 the Tauranga Theatre Organ Society embarked on an ambitious program under the direction of John Parker and Melbourne organist Scott Harrison to improve the playing condition of the instrument. Wind pressures were reset, and rewinding done to improve tremulant performance. Over a period of three years, the five reed ranks were shipped to John Parker's Sydney shop for cleaning, repairs and re-voicing. With the organ now sounding possibly its best ever, the instrument is proving a worthy asset, both to the Baycourt Entertainment Centre and to the city of Tauranga.

At 90 years of age this year, these two very historic Wurlitzer pipe organs are veritable testament that there is a place in the music scene for this unique and still much-loved musical art form.

N.Z. THEATRE ORGANS OVER 90+ YEARS

We had a total of seven theatre organs in theatres dotted around the country back in the heyday of the theatre organ era. Here they are;

- ❖ 1916: Wurlitzer "Photoplayer" Strand Theatre, Queen St Auckland.
- ❖ 1926: Wurlitzer Model F Regent Theatre, Queen St Auckland
- ❖ 1926: Wurlitzer Model H De Luxe (Embassy Theatre) Wellington
- ❖ 1927: Wurlitzer Piano/Console organ Cozy Theatre, Masterton
- ❖ 1928: Wurlitzer Piano/Console organ Paramount Theatre, Nelson then transferred to the Paramount Theatre, Courtenay Pl Wellington
- ❖ 1928: Christie Empire Theatre, Moray Pl Dunedin
- **❖ 1929: Wurlitzer 260 Special Civic Theatre, Queen St Auckland.**

In Preservation today;

Regent Auckland (Hollywood Cinema): enlarged from original 8 ranks of pipes to 15 ranks with a new 3 manual console fitted 1998. Soon to be installed in the Playhouse Theatre, Glen Eden.




ARE YOU AN ENGINEER?


