

The Playhouse Theatre is only ten minutes' drive further west from the Hollywood Cinema, and is VERY accessible by train.



The Swanson train service is verv regular, in fact I have used the train several times to attend meetings at the Playhouse the and theatre is an easy 5 minute walk from the train station as seen below.

There are limited parking spaces at the back of the Playhouse, these are marked with a "PH" for those coming by car. Street parking available as well.



So here's what we have planned for this years "Club Doo".....

- ➤ As the Playhouse theatre has a "**No Food & Drink**" policy in the auditorium, we will begin with Afternoon Tea in the "Supper Room" at the front of the theatre.

Ian Johnston has been part of our House Staff helping out with ushering at our shows for many years. Few will know what talent lies beneath those torch carrying hands! Ian began his 9 year piano tuition at the age of 5. He was playing in 3-4 piece dance bands at the age of 14. Because of his ability to play by ear he was never without opportunities and this continued until he bought his first electronic organ in the late 1960s. It was then that he began playing solo, transporting his organ to venues sometimes up to 7 nights a week. Nowadays he only performs the occasional concert playing audience requests of popular 1920-1980 music



➤ The afternoon will conclude with a nostalgic trip down memory lane, as we enjoy some of the more notable highlights in a 20 minute video tribute to our years at the Hollywood Cinema with the Wurlitzer organ. Artists include; Mark Herman & Anthony Snitker, Margaret Hall with Brett's New Internationals 1920s style band, Chris McPhee & Ryan Heggie, and to conclude, the spectacular Robert Wolfe!

Auckland has a number of electronic organ clubs all putting on concerts, and it is not our intention to step on their toes by doing what they already do, our point of difference was and still is the Wurlitzer pipe organ. However we do need to keep you, our loyal supporters, "engaged" and staying with us until the Wurlitzer is music-making again.

With this in mind, we have Chris Powell from Great Britain visiting us in June and we are currently looking at one more event before the year is over – hopefully we will have details in our next newsletter.

PLAYHOUSE THEATRE UPDATE

FOTW member Graham Upton has created a concept drawing for the Organ Chamber to be built at the back of the building, with the swell shutters opening into the back wall of the stage.

Our organ tech in Melbourne, Julien Arnold, has created a mock layout on paper and it would seem that he can accommodate all the 15 ranks of pipes in the one large chamber – it will be a tight fit, but is still workable for tuning and maintenance.

The "noisy" mechanical parts of the organ such as regulators and tremulants are being installed in a sub-chamber under the floor of the Organ Chamber, which will quieten the organ "wind noise" down greatly.

The Percussion Section is planned to go in a small chamber at the back of the stage up above a walkway that connects to the Green Room.

At this stage the *Waitakere Playhouse Theatre Trust* who administer the theatre, seem very happy with this

third design concept and once they officially approve this, it's then off to the Council for building approval.

There is concern from some members of the *Playhouse Theatre Incorporated,* who are the resident theatrical group at the Playhouse, that the organ will see them ousted from their home, not to mention other negative effects that the installation of the Wurlitzer will have on the theatre.

It is sad that this misinformation has created a situation that is totally unnecessary, and dampens slightly, the win-win for all parties should the organ come to the Playhouse. We are working with the WPTT to try and quell their fears that this is *not* a take-over, and that we *can* work together in harmony. The organ only uses the theatre for approximately 21 days scattered throughout the year.

We certainly never dominated or dictated terms to the Hollywood Manager, we were very much there by good-grace only, and we knew it!

2015 IN REVIEW

For your interest, we reprint some of the more newsy items from the 2015 Annual Report of the Chairman of the Wurlitzer Organ Trust of Auckland.

The Shows in 2015:

2015 opened in the usual way with a successful and fun Club Afternoon for our *Friends of the Wurlitzer*.

Then in April, Melbourne's John Atwell was in town for an ANZAC Weekend presentation featuring the silent movie "Wings" and a program titled "The Music that got us through the War Years". The movie "Wings" was John's first foray into a "main feature" silent movie score and he sure brought this 2 hour movie marathon to life.



June saw Chris McPhee and Rosanne Hosking from Adelaide (pictured left) spectacular us a show, the enjoyment of which was somewhat marred when we were advised by the Hollywood Cinema manager that the building was going on the market and the organ must be out by September 30!

Our October and November shows had to cancelled with already booked August show featuring the USA's Jelani Eddington, bringing to a close 32 years of music-making at the Hollywood Cinema by our Wurlitzer pipe organ.

Obviously, our statistics are somewhat skewed by the short concert season,

with our average audience numbers attending shows rising slightly from 226 in 2014 to 241 this year.

As a matter of interest the Trust raised \$2366.74 for the Hollywood Cinema from the "Wings" silent movie show.

Once again this year, our application to *Foundation North* (formerly the *ASB Community Trust*) for funding support for the five planned "Pops Concert" shows was accepted. This funding was for the following essential operating costs;

- Organ Tuning = \$540 per show.
- Venue Hire = \$517.50 per show.
- occupation of the stage by the organ chambers = \$720.00 per show
- Coast Radio Advert Campaign = \$2825.55
- NZ Herald Advertising/Promo (portion) = \$600.00 per show

Total applied for was \$14,538.60 Total Awarded by Foundation North was \$10,000.00

As the full total was not spent as intended, *Foundation North* permitted us to transfer the balance of \$3500 to assist in the cost of removal of the Wurlitzer organ from the Hollywood Cinema and putting it into storage.

Promotion

Once again I uploaded information and promotion for our shows to the *Eventfinda* website with us receiving hits up in the thousands for all shows. It proves that although all website viewers of the event did not actually attend the show, we do have a presence and people are aware of our work. All the main media sources such as the NZ Herald feed from *Eventfinda* and populate their own "What's On" columns from info on this site.

I also continued to maintain the Trust's website and keep show information updated. Our promotion is boosted by the small number of printed posters, circulated by some Trustees and FOTW members to libraries and music shops, together with a shared ad with the cinema placed in the NZ Herald promoting each show over two weekends prior.

The Trust resolved to run an advertising campaign with "Coast 104.5 FM" in a bid to boost numbers. It had been hoped that the *Foundation North* funding might assist with this but the grant did not cover this expense, so WOTA carried this cost itself.

Organ Works

Our biggest project for 2015 was ultimately the dismantling, crating and transport to storage of our heritage 1926 Wurlitzer pipe organ.

Quotes were sourced with urgency and an application made to *The Trust Community Foundation* who awarded WOTA \$25k.

The finished job actually cost \$32,148.16.



Lead by WOTA Trustee Graham McBain, a great team of volunteers came forward to assist Melbourne Organ Builder Julian Arnold, his son Mark and Mark's fiancé Robyn. Julien together with our team had the Wurlitzer out of the Hollywood in a mere ten days – this despite statements from another organ builder that it would

at least a month or more to dismantle, crate and transport the instrument away. It now resides in a safe, dry and stable atmosphere Kennards at а Storage Facility.

The Hollywood's manager had originally stated that the two plinths that housed the console and piano respectively could remain in situ together with the organ chambers on the stage. Our only requirement was to ensure that the holes through the stage floor, that once carried the organ wind lines, be patched up. However the builder doing this work stated he could not fulfil this task with the chambers in situ, so the decision had to be taken to demolish the chambers. This cost was shared with the Hollywood 50/50, an unexpected expense that WOTA certainly did not need.

When the organ removal invoices were totalled up and submitted to TTCF for confirmation of our expenditure, although we had made significant savings, there were additional costs such as the Chamber demolition, that were not foreseen and we requested that the surplus balance be used to cover these invoices, however they declined the request, and a sum of some \$4027.06 had to be paid back to TTCF and WOTA had to find a further \$3306.25 to cover the Chamber demolition and stage floor repairs..

WOTA has only enough funds to cover the storage costs of the instrument until the start of 2017.

Possible New Home for the ex-Regent Wurlitzer pipe organ

Shortly after news went public on the sale of the Hollywood and the fate of our historic Wurlitzer organ; we were approached by people associated with the

Playhouse Theatre in Glen Eden, suggesting we might consider it as a possible new home for the Wurlitzer organ.

Over the following months, negotiations began, discussing possible concepts for the location of the organ's infrastructure and this has been a slow, but steady process. The WPTT are determined in their hope that the organ might move there, and are proceeding with due diligence to ensure that the other parties at the Playhouse are not disadvantaged by the organ's installation. The WPTT have also co-opted WOTA Chairman James Duncan.

It would appear the best solution is for an annex to be built on the end of the building at the back of the stage and this to house all the pipe work. A smaller chamber built above the rear of the stage will house the percussions. Console and piano will be installed in the orchestra pit at the front of the stage. The WPTT are hoping for building to be completed by mid-2016.

Julien Arnold is a key advisor in these negotiations and Trustee Neil Warrington is Project Leader and coordinator.

General

- ➤ Jan Nancekivell, continued to look after the critical roles of Concert Ticket Secretary and Membership Secretary for the Friends of the Wurlitzer.
- > Neil Warrington managed the Open Console Sessions until August when the organ was removed from the Hollywood.
- As we moved closer to "O.R-Day" (Organ Removal), I must admit to being comforted by the stalwart commitment shown by Trustees, as demands on



their time was tested with almost weekly meetings, either face-to-face or via Skype. I think it true to say that this dramatic turn of events could have seen our demise, but it actually had the opposite effect. Through your very vocal support of my leadership and the dedication for the organ's survival that you all demonstrated, we survived our darkest days! For this I give you my heart-felt appreciation.

Despite a very distressing end to our association with the Hollywood Cinema and the Wurlitzer organ's very successful 32 year residence there, this situation has brought the Trust closer together, with a united goal of seeing the organ making music again in a new home.
